**The Autumn Meeting of Friends of the Meadows & Bruntsfield Links will be held on Monday 22 November at 7.30 p.m. in the Arran Room, Gillis Centre (entrance on Strathearn Road). The speaker will be local historian Graeme Cruickshank, on 'The history of golf on Bruntsfield Links'.

The two preceding talks in this trilogy have dealt with the history of the Meadows, and the history of Bruntsfield Links. While the Meadows present a linear progression in their development, and could therefore be dealt with coherently in a single talk, the same cannot really be said of the Links. The second talk therefore dealt with various aspects of their social history, though excluding the major strand that ran through it - '*The Gowff*'. This talk will concentrate on the topic of golf on Bruntsfield Links, looking at some colourful characters and memorable incidents.



Green issues: a new initiative from Tollcross

Tollcross Energy and Carbon Saving Ltd is a company of local people who came together in Autumn 2009 to raise awareness on how to save money, energy and carbon. TECS is funded by the Scottish Government Climate Challenge Fund to work with local residents to cut carbon emissions. We believe that each of us can do something to help, but that working together as a community we can do more.

We held an energy awareness event in January 2010 in the Barclay Viewforth Church, with stalls, displays and presentations on the productive use of back greens, Lister Housing Cooperative's solar panels and energy efficiency measures, the installation of heat source pumps, home energy and water efficiency measures, and products made from recycled materials. We also heard about what Edinburgh Transition South has been able to achieve. Votes were cast at this meeting for the following projects:

Tenement (insulation, bike racks)	17
	votes
Back green composting	12
Local food	10
Home energy/ water efficiency	9
Heat source pumps/ solar panels	9
Community gardens	7



We have also carried out a questionnaire survey of households in Tollcross. Responses from residents show most interest in energy use in the home, particularly how to save on heating and lighting. Fifty-five per cent walk as their main means of transport, with 14% relying on their car; 8% regularly use their bike. Residents find it easier to recycle clothing than plastics and glass in the Tollcross area.

Our next initiative is to install bike racks in 10 tenements in Tollcross **by the end of the year**. We have a budget of £1500 for this.

We are 10 years old!

An extract from the first edition of FOMBL newsletter, Autumn 2001

Meanwhile, a tree was planted on the edge of the Links near Wrights Houses by Cllr Steve Cardownie (CEC Leisure and Culture) and Dr Chris Wigglesworth (Secretary FoMBL), to commemorate the launch of the 'Friends of Parks' initiative on the day of the heaviest snowfall of the winter (26 February 2001).

Scottish Furniture Makers Association is donated elms from the Meadows and Links

The City of Edinburgh Council is donating six elms to the Scottish Furniture Makers Association (SFMA) for use by members to build furniture for the forthcoming Dovecot gallery exhibition (Oct 2011). A small party of SFMA members toured the Bruntsfield Links/Meadows with forestry/parkland officials from CEC, and provisionally selected half a dozen of the elms which are due to be felled shortly, due to the ravages of Dutch elm disease. These trees promise some spectacular timber, and we applaud the city council for being keen to be involved in this initiative. They are all thought to have been planted around 150 years ago (according to Keith Logie, Edinburgh parks manager).

This first tree is very local to where I stay now, and co-incidentally to the very first flat I lived in when I came to Edinburgh over 40 years ago. It came into full leaf in late spring this year, but during the summer months died back rapidly with Dutch elm disease and acquired the Council's big red X, meaning it is now for the chop. On the basis of the two trees I have (kind of) measured, we probably have a total volume of about 250 cu.ft. in the six trees. All we need to do now is bridge the small gap between the standing trees and getting the dry planking on to makers' benches and ready to rock. As they say in the trade, what could possibly go wrong?
