General Maczek Memorial

Some of you may remember the AGM in 2013 when Lord Fraser of Carmyllie addressed the group, and secured our support and enthusiasm for this project, to install a memorial bench on the Meadows to General Stanislaw Maczek, a Polish veteran of World War II. Maczek had a long and distinguished career in the Polish army. He fought in three campaigns, in Poland, France and North-West Europe. From 1942 to 1945 he commanded the First Polish Armoured Division. As part of the Allied Forces, the Division played a vital role in the Normandy fighting. It then advanced through France into Belgium and Holland, liberating many grateful citizens in these countries.

Maczek lived out his final years in Edinburgh, since he was unable to return to Communist Poland after the war. However, the UK government did not give him a pension, so he was obliged to work as a barman in Marchmont. My neighbour, who is a driving instructor, says he also remembers him teaching driving under the name 'White Eagle'.

The Order of the White Eagle

The Order of the White Eagle was the name of Poland's highest award, with which he was finally decorated. Maczek used to walk his disabled daughter round the Meadows and Links in her wheelchair, and originally FOMBL were very happy to support the campaign for a memorial bench to him on the Links. All went well, and the fund was increasing, until last year a Council lawyer found objections to the proposed bench, saying that it was a 'building' and therefore contravened the Confirmation Act 1991, forbidding any such structures on the Meadows or Links. This was a great disappointment to us, and we still don't understand the reasoning.

However, the Trustees of the General Maczek Memorial Trust were not to be discouraged, and finally the Council have agreed that the memorial can go instead in the courtyard at the side of the Council's City Chambers in the High Street. While FOMBL is disappointed that there will be no

bench on the Links, at the same time we have to be happy that the alternative site is even more prestigious, and that the bench can now be erected before Maczek's friends and colleagues are no longer with us. Edinburgh's Lord Provost, Frank Ross, has said: 'We're delighted that this fitting tribute to General Stanislaw Maczek and his men is to be placed in such close proximity to the war memorial at the City Chambers. It will be located in a highly visible spot, right outside our recently refurbished Registrar's office, where many people will pass by and have the opportunity to reflect on the General's heroics and the many other war heroes who risked their lives during combat . . .'

FOMBL Trustees, while sad that the bench will no longer be on the Links, feel that some Meadows memorial is certainly indicated, and are now proposing a General Maczek Walk, which will adopt an unnamed path leading from Marchmont to the east end of Glengyle Terrace, a route which he would certainly have walked. We feel this will be a fitting tribute. (Ed.)

The naming of paths

While we are thinking of new paths, we need to mention also our plan, together with the Council, in particular Melanie Main, Green Councillor, to name a path on Bruntsfield Links after **Muriel Spark**, in this the centenary year of her birth. The plan is to have a ceremony during the Meadows Festival, followed by a few drinks. Exact arrangements are yet to be made: we will circulate details nearer the time. We have already honoured Dame Muriel with a quotation from *The Prime of Miss Jean Brodie* in our Meadows Mural, but this is a further opportunity to mark her association with the Links, over which she must have walked many times when she lived in Bruntsfield and attended James Gillespie's School for Girls. A website Muriel Spark 100 (@MurielSpark100) has been set up: do visit it!

A further female path-finder was **Sophia Jex-Blake** (1840-1912), who led the campaign to secure women access to a University education when she and six other women, collectively known as the [Edinburgh Seven](#), began studying medicine at Edinburgh University in 1869. She was the first practising female doctor in Scotland; a leading campaigner for women's medical education, and was involved in founding two medical schools for women (at a time when no other medical schools were training women). Sophia lived and conducted her practice for 16 years in the house known as Bruntsfield Lodge on Whitehouse Loan. When she retired in 1889 the Edinburgh Hospital and Dispensary for Women and Children moved to this site, and became known as [Bruntsfield Hospital](#), where it continued to function on the site until 1989. She too surely deserves a path in her name on Bruntsfield Links. (Ed.)

The Jawbones

We are very pleased to be able to bring you an up-to-date report on this project

The conservation of the Jawbones for return to outside condition has proved very challenging, not least because of the presence of historic repairs using harmful materials such as car-body filler and concrete. In January we arranged for Nigel Larkin, an expert on whalebones and their conservation, to inspect the bones and advise on their return to the Meadows. He has identified additional treatment required, and recommended enhanced structural support for the reinstalled arch. He has also suggested that once complete, the bones should be 3D scanned again so that we will have computer data to use should a replica be required at some time in the future when the bones inevitably decay beyond repair.

Further funds are going to be needed to complete the project, and Edinburgh World Heritage and the City of Edinburgh Council are seeking extra funding to allow completion and reinstallation of the Arch. *Fiona Rankin, World Heritage Site Project Manager*

Community Garden

The Community Garden project has welcomed the Spring with a new growing programme (following our potato beds in 2017) devised by Emma, our horticulture advisor. We now have two cold-frames to bring on lettuces and other tender edibles, and a great variety of seeds will be sown in stages in the other beds and around the perimeter. A



splendid demonstration bench has been installed with Co-op Community Funding, which is already very popular. Sciennes Primary School children help us to garden, and their eco club plans to install an organic insect hotel next door; we will soon be enjoying the hum of insects in our meadow and orchard. *[As we go to press the Meadows are deep in snow, so we have shown you a picture of a snow-man guarding the plot instead of primroses. - Ed.]*.

The **Wildflower Plot** off Lonsdale Terrace is stirring into life as well. Spot the primroses! Donations of plants are appreciated – we currently meet at the Community Garden at 12 noon every Saturday, and everyone is welcome. There’s always plenty to do.

Project update: a report on progress

Helen Acquroff Fountain Restoration and Information Board

Last year, the fountain and surrounding paving were successfully restored by Erik Kirkwood. After many attempts at getting consensus on the content of the text, we managed to achieve the fixing of an information board to the railings. The final phase will be improving the surrounding paving edges, including laying setts under the information board. We now have a quote for this, which has been approved, and the work should be completed by the end of April.

Restoration of the Sundial Pillar in the west Meadows

Last year the joints between the granite setts were cleaned out and mortared with a very durable mix and now look nice and smart. The cost of this was met by a private donation, and we are very grateful. The original 1886 cast iron railings were painted by Mark McCathie, and now look as good as new (almost!). The cost of this was met by funds provided by Underbelly receipts via the Council and FOMBL. The next phase is the installation of an information board, along with granite setts laid around the board support. This has been funded by a local community grant, with installation and sett laying by the Parks department, though due to bad weather the installation has been delayed until April.

Painting of railings

The Council had no funds in their budget to paint the low metal railings that protect large areas of grass and trees. Without painting these now there would be a risk of metal rusting, and consequently much higher costs to deal with in the future. Mark McCathie has now painted 190 metres in high-quality black Hammerite, and we have asked for further funds to complete another 500 metres at Bruntsfield Links and near the Cricket Pavilion. Mark also clears out earth and weeds at the base of metal supports to enable painting as close to the ground as possible.



Playground equipment

Following the success of installing toddlers' play equipment in the West Links playground, we were successful in bidding for funds to install new toddler equipment in the East Meadows play area, which has been neglected for many years. We hope to add more apparatus soon. This equipment has been ordered by James Galloway, the Council's playground supremo, and it is hoped that further improvements can be made in this much loved play area.

Information boards

There are three information boards in the process of being designed, and it is hoped to erect these in early summer. They will describe the history of the Royal Infirmary and Quatermile; the Masons' Pillars at the West entrance to the Meadows, and the Nelson Pillars at the East entrance.

Exercise equipment

Last year three items of equipment were installed at the East Meadows, Central Meadows and Bruntsfield Links. It was intended that these would form the basis of the exercise trail and would be augmented by additional equipment at each location. Three new items have now been ordered, and it is hoped that these will be installed in April/May.

We owe a debt of gratitude to Neil for his careful and persistent work on this comprehensive scheme of projects, which will add greatly to the attraction of the Meadows and Links as a place for recreation, renewal, and the study of our history. It has not been easy, but we are delighted that we have such a well qualified and knowledgeable volunteer to see the scheme through to success. (Ed.)
